Annual Report Overview

Neighbour 2 Neighbour's Hamilton Community Garden Networking program provides support for garden coordinators, gardeners, and community members wanting to connect with community gardens in Hamilton. An annual report is produced to reflect on the program and for the greater community to see what was accomplished. In order to assess how Neighbour 2 Neighbour provides support to community gardens, an annual program survey is conducted with garden coordinators. The results help to adjust programming and improve the ways help is provided to gardens in the city. The findings of the survey are included in the Annual Report.

HCGN Program Support for Gardens

Neighbour 2 Neighbour offers annual Resource Boost opportunities for community gardens to access tools, equipment, and materials to improve their community gardens. In addition to this support, a webpage featuring an online Hamilton Garden Directory, interactive map and library of online resources for coordinating gardens is maintained and a garden coordinator email list-serv is moderated.

- Resource Boosts in the Spring and Fall of 2023 provided over \$3,500 in new gardening equipment. Through the HCGN, \$600 in native pollinator plants and shrubs were distributed to community gardens in 2023.
- 53% of gardens surveyed said that the HCGN Resource Boost was a significant means of financial assistance. Rental fees, grants and donations were the next most significant sources of funding.
- Top 3 garden expenses in 2023 were 1. Garden Equipment (tools, hoses, etc.) 2. Soil/Compost and Water (for those not receiving water in-kind from the City of Hamilton), and 3. Building materials (for planters, raised beds, fences, sheds etc).

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Community Gardening Benefits

Community Gardens improve life in the City of Hamilton in the following ways:

Build Community

People develop and leverage relationships and new partnerships out of gardens.

- The T. Melville Bailey Park Community Garden was built through the leadership of St. Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton with the goal of providing programming on-site for clients.
- Roots to Justice Hamilton expanded on their garden built in 2022 to offer weekly public programming for community residents and the Roots to Justice Youth Garden Program for community members 15-19 years old.
- The McMaster Teaching and Learning Garden, renamed the "OPIRG McMaster Community Garden", expanded their site on campus at 1280 Main Street West because of the growing community of gardeners.

Enhance the Environment

Community gardens help the ecosystem in many ways.

- Nearly all community gardens surveyed report using ecologically sound gardening practices including on-site composting, creating habitat for indigenous plants and insects, rainwater collection and crop-rotation.
- Approximately 700 square feet of community garden space was created in 2023.
- 61 native plants were given out to gardens in the HCGN, converting more than 650 square feet back to natural habitat for pollinators and other beneficial species.

Promote Wellness

Community gardens increase access to fresh produce while promoting an active lifestyle and community involvement.

- More than 711 gardeners representing 372 families grew food in gardens across Hamilton.
- An estimated 3,163 lbs of produce were donated to food banks or food programs.
- Riverdale Salad Bowl Community Garden (Ward 6) received the Community Trillium Award in recognition of their positive contribution to the City of Hamilton.
